Please refer to your Letter No. 7(1)EE/Plan/2011 dated 1/6/2011 enclosing therewith a copy of the order dated 20/5/2011 of the Division Bench of Rajasthan High Court, Jodhpur in D.B. Civil Writ Petition No. 3964/2011 filed by Shri Sushil Sompura & Others vs. State Education and others. Your letter alongwith the judgement of the Hon'ble High Court of Rajasthan have been examined in the NCTE. Response to main issues is as follows:

1. Minimum %age of Marks:

So far as the issue of securing a minimum percentage of marks at the Senior Secondary / bachelor Degree Level for admission to the BSTC/B.Ed. courses is concerned, on examination, it has been found that factually wrong statement was made before the hon'ble High Court about the minimum qualifying marks required by candidates seeking admission to different teacher training courses. The statement that "for the first time, De-Novo qualifications were prescribed by the NCTE vide notification dated 27.09.2007 and further qualifications were prescribed vide notification dated 31.08.2009" is factually incorrect. Consequently, the Hon'ble High Court has ruled that in case admission has been taken by the incumbents in any of the courses of B.Ed., B.El.Ed. etc prior to aforesaid dates, they shall not insist for having 45% or 50 % marks as the case may be, in qualifying examinations for aforesaid courses.

The NCTE is taking appropriate action against concerned officials involved in making such factually wrong submissions before the Hon'ble High Court. Further, the NCTE is also taking urgent steps to file Review Petition before the Hon'ble High Court seeking review of the aforesaid observations in the orders of the Hon'ble High Court in this regard.

As you are aware the NCTE was established on August 17, 1995. Immediately after its establishment, it took up the task of framing Regulations, norms and standards for various levels of teacher education courses including D.El.Ed., B.Ed and M.Ed. courses. The norms and standards leading to D.El.Ed and B.Ed etc. courses were for the first time notified in the Gazette of India vide Notification dated 24th February 1996 wherein the entry Qualification for admission to D.El.Ed and B.Ed etc. courses was 50% at +2 and 45% at graduation levels respectively.

These norms and standards were revised from time to time and the entry qualification for admission to teacher education courses were revised. Following is a tabular statement giving notification of norms and standards with entry qualification of D.El.Ed, B.El.Ed and B.Ed etc. courses.

The above position may be brought to the notice of the Hon'ble High Court and an application submitted to the Hon'ble High Court for review of the directions not to insist upon the academic qualifications of 45% or 50% marks before 2007 and 2009. It is not known as to how some candidates have been permitted to do B.Ed. etc by the institutions in Rajasthan after 1996 without having minimum 45% or 50% marks. It is also not known as to how many candidates have applied for TET who had completed a teacher education course prior to 1996. It is unlikely that they are still eligible for appointment in terms of age limit.
